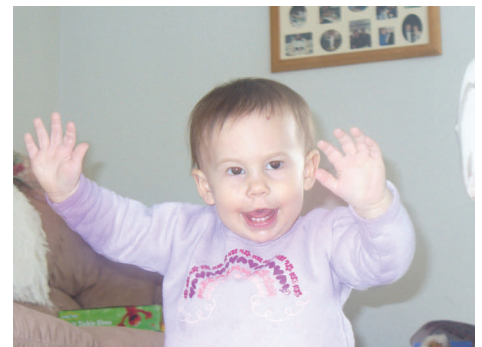

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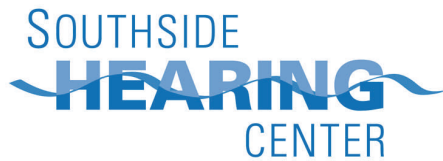

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What's New in Audiology?

This question is not your typical run-of-the-mill question. Technology is always the answer, however. The manufacturers are always launching “new” hearing products. Interestingly, the manufacturers are responding to the economic times by launching scaled down versions of their top product lines to make the products more affordable. This was certainly the theme for every manufacturer at the convention in Dallas back in early April. One of the most exciting products, however, was not a hearing aid, but an accessory to the hearing aids. Oticon launched products that allow you to use certain Oticon hearing aids with a wireless connector to the TV, and even telephone. It's similar to the TV Ears you may have seen advertised, but used with your hearing aids instead. Of course the catch is that it only works with Oticon hearing aids that are capable of this system. It's exciting, but not universal to all hearing aids. I listened to the system and it is very nice. I hope to have a demo of it in the near future. Oticon is not the only manufacturer to have such a system...Siemens does as well, and I'm sure the others will soon if they don't already have them. ■

Janet's Two Cents—Summer Hearing Protection

Impulse noises are more hazardous than most people realize and they are also very common. Often I've heard from patients (with hearing loss) that they have fired weapons without using hearing protection. The blast from just one gunshot increases your risk of developing permanent hearing loss. Other summertime activities can be quite loud as well, such as lawnmowers, saws, trimmers, farm equipment and fireworks. Most people don't know about the risks of these loud noises, thinking if it's just for a short duration it won't harm their ears. Remember that there are plenty of excellent hearing protection options available. Just ask us! ■
